AREAS OF WORK



NEWFOUNDLAND AND LABRADOR: GEOGRAPHY & CONTEXT

- 530,000 people; 228,000 in St. John's CMA
- No other communities larger than 25,000
- St. John's in the extreme east of the province; 8 hours drive to Corner Brook, 20+ hours to Happy-Valley Goose Bay
- Services for vulnerable populations concentrated in St. John's
- More than 40% of the St. John's homeless population come from outside the city

NEWFOUNDLAND AND LABRADOR: HOW CFY FITS IN

- The only organization in the province with a specific mandate to serve at-risk youth
- Large, high-capacity organization
- Investments in policy and advocacy work
- Record of success and great relationships with government
- Little experience with work outside of the city or with Indigenous communities
