



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

The excitement generated by the release of Canada's Housing Plan in Budget 2024 has been tempered by the fact that much of the promised funding and program development were delayed as MPs shifted their focus from solving the housing crisis to preparing for an inevitable upcoming election. The uncertainty this has brought, along with the threat to housing development posed by US tariffs and inflation have left the sector on shaky ground in terms of planning and development. What's more, \$2.8 billion in funding for urban, rural, and northern (URN) Indigenous housing, committed to in Budget 2023, has been left unallocated as URN Indigenous housing providers face another year without the funds needed to move forward on planned, shovel-ready projects.

Over the years, we've learned that we're stronger when we stand together. We've learned that the community housing sector has the expertise, resourcefulness, and dedication to weather all kinds of uncertainty – we've done it again and again.

That's why gatherings like this one are so critical. Over the next few days, you'll attend workshops and sessions led

by housing professionals, scholars, and leaders who are working on real, tangible solutions to our housing crisis. You'll get the chance to make new contacts, catch up with old friends, and share what you've been working on. Don't miss out on our social events – these informal connections are often just as valuable as formal learning sessions.

We're proud to be hosting the third annual Indigenous Innovation Forum (IIF). This event has been a must-attend since its original appearance at the 2023 Congress in Winnipeg. 





Dr. Prentiss Dantzler, Associate Professor, Founding Director of the Housing Justice Lab, University of Toronto Salon ABCD

Dr. Prentiss A. Dantzler is an Associate Professor in the Department of Sociology and Founding Director of the Housing Justice Lab within the School of Cities at the University of Toronto. As an interdisciplinary communityengaged scholar, his research focuses on housing policy, neighborhood change, race and ethnic relations, and community development. Prentiss received his Ph.D. in Public Affairs with a concentration in Community Development from Rutgers University-Camden. He also holds an M.P.A. from West Chester University and a B.S. from Penn State University.

Dantzler's work has been published in various academic journals and popular media outlets and sponsored by several funding agencies. He is also the Founder of The Urban Agenda LLC, a consulting group that focuses on capacity building, technical assistance and policy advocacy across North American cities.

Given these experiences, Dantzler's keynote will focus on the changing ethos of homeownership and how our collective ideas to own have (re)produced racialized uneven development. 

The presentation by Tribal Chief Mark Arcand outlines the efforts of the Saskatoon Tribal Council (STC) in addressing the homelessness crisis in Saskatoon. It highlights the significant increase in homelessness from 550 individuals in 2022 to 1,499 in 2024, driven by factors such as housing affordability, changes in social assistance and mental health issues. The presentation details STC's comprehensive response through the Emergency Wellness Centre, which provides wrap-around services including cultural supports, healthcare, and housing assistance. It emphasizes the need for coordinated efforts, adequate funding, and support for First Nationsled solutions to effectively tackle homelessness and improve the quality of life for affected individuals.

Funding Innovation: Creative strategies to deliver housing solutions Gallery A

Highlighted sites include St. Mary's Wellness & Education Centre, the Round Prairie Elders Lodge, two recent Rapid Housing Initiative projects, Prairie Harm Reduction, Westside Community Clinic, and STC Health Centre.



Built in under three years through the Rapid Housing Initiative, this project showcases the power of collaboration, integrating funding from all levels of government and an innovative design-build approach. With spacious 2- and 3-bedroom suites designed to keep families together, the building addresses the urgent demand for safe, supportive housing – demand that saw over 4,700 women and children turned away annually. This tour offers a glimpse into a model solution for the housing crisis, where compassion and innovation create lasting impact.

Mobile Tour 6: Partnerships and Supportive Housing/Social Housing Rejuvenation

Partnerships between housing providers, service providers, and government agencies are crucial for developing strong housing programs. This tour provides an opportunity to tour two unique projects that highlight the value of partnership and collaboration.

Kii Kinaahk Village, comprised of two separate apartment buildings, is a supportive housing program operated by SaskNative Rentals in partnership with Saskatoon Crisis Intervention Services and Prairie Harm Reduction. Kii Kinaahk operates on a clientcentred, harm reduction basis and offers programming including a Managed Alcohol Program, onsite nursing staff, cultural and peer supports, and intensive case management. Kii Kinaahk has seen strong outcomes for their tenants, who are considered to be among Saskatoon's "hardest to house."

Leif Erickson Place, a 61-unit Saskatoon Housing Authority social housing project, had not seen any major renovations since its construction and required extensive work to address code upgrades for tenant safety, functionality, and appeal. The project was completed over four years, using a phased approach for minimal impact to the existing tenants. The result of this project is a refreshed and modernized complex, which now houses 52 families ranging in size from two to 10 people.



Saskatchewan Housing Corporation (SHC) is a Treasury Board Crown Corporation responsible for housing policy, programs and services in Saskatchewan. Operating under the authority of *The Saskatchewan Housing Corporation Act*, SHC is accountable to Cabinet through the Minister of Social Services.

Mandate

SHC provides housing and housing services to people who could not otherwise afford or access adequate, safe and secure shelter, while recognizing the marketplace as the primary housing provider in the province. SHC also plays a lead role in developing housing policies on behalf of the Government of Saskatchewan and manages financial contributions from the provincial, federal and municipal levels of government, as well as revenues from rents.

Providing Support along the Housing Continuum

Working alongside other provincial ministries, housing authorities, community partners, and local governments, SHC strives to create and offer an array of housing programs and services along the housing continuum:


- Emergency shelter addresses immediate needs for a warm and safe place to stay.
- Supportive housing provides stability and support for people who need help with addictions and mental health support.
- Social housing offers rent based on income for families and seniors.
- Rental benefits help tenants afford housing costs in the private market.
